In the normal course of events this editorial would almost certainly have been commenting on the fact we have a new Prime Minister and trying to make some vaguely witty comment about pork and cheese markets. However, another event has completely overshadowed everything else; the passing of our beloved Queen, Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II on Thursday 8 September, who dedicated her life in the service of this country.

Hearing the news of her passing is one of those events such as the assassination of President Kennedy, the death of Princess Diana, or 9/11 that people will remember exactly where they were. During the course of that Thursday afternoon, it was becoming clear that the news about Her Majesty's health was not going to be good and I suspect by the time the news finally broke many people would have been settling down to their evening meal. Rather curiously and perhaps fittingly I was wearing full black tie when I heard the news. Now before everyone runs away with the idea that the Dwane family always dress formally for dinner in a throwback to Edwardian times, I should point out I was in the ballroom of the Duke of Cornwall Hotel about to attend a retired naval officer's function, when a member of the hotel staff gave us the sad news. Being too late to cancel, the dinner started with a minute's silence and concluded with the loyal toast, as tradition would dictate to, "The King."

Enough of me, the closest I ever came to meeting Her Majesty was through a pair of binoculars, when she met President Clinton at the 50th Anniversary of the D-Day Landings. There are bound to be individuals in Pillaton who have their own very personal memories and much more telling stories of meeting her in person. For the rest of us it has been a case of witnessing everything though the medium of television and newspapers. It is probably true to say that no-one in history has had their life documented in such minute detail and for such an extended length of time, but what a life.

By way of a memorial to Her Majesty's life on the front cover, rather than use a contemporary image I have used one taken by the society photographer Dorothy Wilding on 26 February 1952. If it looks familiar this is because the photograph formed the basis of all British stamps and coins for the first 15 years of the Queen's reign. It was taken less than three weeks after the death of Her Majesty's father King George VI, and despite this she was still able to combine her natural film star looks with elegance and poise and perhaps an early precursor to the manner in which she selflessly served her country throughout her life.

MINUTES OF PARISH COUNCIL MEETING 6 SEPTEMBER 2022

<u>DECLARATIONS OF INTEREST</u> None.

PUBLIC FORUM

There were no members of the public present.

MINUTES

The minutes of 5th July 2022 Council meeting were accepted unanimously.

MATTERS ARISING

- a) <u>Signage</u> The Council accepted Cllr Johnson's kind offer to donate an additional line to the new Playing field sign informing visitors to report any problems at the Playing field to the Chairman.
- b) <u>Zip Wire</u> It was noted that the zip wire was the correct length purchased and that the Chair and vice Chair had tightened the wire thus improving the performance of the equipment.
- c) <u>Slide</u> The Council believed that there was no requirement to have additional matting at the bottom of the slide and that with the end of the unusually dry weather the grass would re-establish itself.

FINANCE

The Council approved the following payments; £42 to Mr Sticker for playing field sign and £45 to Mr Lawson for web hosting.

ANY OTHER BUSINESS

- 1. The Council endorsed the offer of the Playing Field Support Group to pay for an independent new risk assessment at the playing field following the installation of new equipment.
- 2. The Playing Field Support group offered to seek replacement netting for the goal posts.
- 3. It was noted that the repainting of the telephone box was in progress.
- 4. As dedicated WI-Fi connection for the defibrillator had now been installed thanks were recorded to Phil Ruby for allowing use of his Wi-Fi for communication to the defibrillator up to this point.
- 5. The Council decided not to progress with any official Neighbourhood Watch scheme as they felt that neighbours already alerted fellow neighbours of unusual activity and that the Police appeared inactive in this field.
- 6. The poor state of the road surface at Briars Ryn was noted and would be kept under review by the Council.

MZIMVUBU

No, not a tongue twister, nor even a useful Scrabble word to use up all those awkward letters! So, what is it and where?

The Diocese of Mzimvubu is in the Eastern Cape Province of South Africa and since 2000, when the then Bishop of St. Germans visited the area, has been linked with the Diocese of Truro. The Mzimvubu river, 250 km long, is one of the most important rivers in South Africa. Work has been under way for several years on the Mzimvubu Water Project, intended to maximise use of the river's resources for irrigation and power by constructing dams.

The area has many problems, including extreme poverty, exacerbated by Covid-19 and climate change. Children who were orphaned when their parents died from HIV, but were cared for subsequently by grandparents, are alone again as grandparents themselves succumbed to Covid-19.

Many people in the area have no source of income other than their farms and livestock. Whereas previously, work was available in the mines or sugar cane fields, the slowdown in the economy has left the majority of families with no work.

To alleviate the suffering, the Diocese of Truro has been contributing on a quarterly basis to a feeding programme, helping support some of the most desperate families in the region. As well as food, the programme supports the children with blankets and school uniforms.

So, what has all this to do with Pillaton? Well, our two churches at St. Mellion and Pillaton fall within the Tamar Valley Benefice, which in turn lies within the Diocese of Truro. Traditionally, our church congregations have always looked beyond the local communities to those less fortunate than ourselves. Over the years, we have helped charities such as Callington Foodbank, Children's Hospice Southwest, St. Luke's Hospice, St. Petroc's Society for the homeless and others.

We shall continue to support our local charities – this year we will be donating to St. Petroc's Society again, as their work is needed more than ever in these troubled times – but we are looking at ways of developing a relationship with Mzimvubu too.

The Diocese of Truro's "International Links Programme" aims to build links with communities in other countries and offer mutual support between cultures. We hope to be a part of this and as a PCC (Parochial Church Council) we are actively exploring ways of working with Mzimvubu. We expect to learn and gain from the sharing experience as well as hopefully giving something in return.

THE BUILDING NEXT TO THE PUB (2)

What a sensible and sensitive article about 'the building next to the pub' was contributed by Sue McClaughry in the last issue of the Pillaton News. Personally, I rarely attend church services having little time for some of the outdated rituals of the Church of England, but I completely respect the beliefs and views of those who find comfort and solace in their religion. However, like Sue, and I suspect most Pillaton villagers, I consider the church building beautiful and appreciate its historical significance and so would not wish it to fall into disuse or disrepair. For any public building in the twenty first century to be without running water, toilet facilities or adequate heating seems to me to be scandalous, especially since this could so easily have been rectified when the church underwent major renovation after the lightning strike in 2012.

The 'On the Way' Steering Group, concerned with the future of our local churches, focuses exclusively on their use for worship and ministry, and if this prevails then Pillaton Church will almost certainly be closed. This would be an enormous loss to the wider social life of the village, and in my view, it is imperative that worship is not the only criterion to be considered. Inspection of the membership of the Steering Group suggests that it is only this activity that is represented; of particular relevance to me - there are certainly no bellringers! So, I hope the Group will invite representatives of other social activities to join it, so that decisions regarding church closures can be made based on human logical reasoning and not just on what the committee regards as "God's given vision."

Previous generations have often altered and modernised church buildings to suit the needs of the community at that time, not always so sensitively as it is possible to do now bearing in mind the preservation of historically important structures. I know that making the church more comfortable and more adaptable to other activities would cost money but there are numerous sources of funding available in the form of grants from charitable foundations and the formation of an organisation such as 'Friends of Pillaton Church' as Sue suggests would enable local fundraising to take place on a much more formal basis.

So far, the maintenance of Pillaton Church has been adequate to ensure that it remains in good condition, but with dwindling congregations and the church's continued failure to attract younger supporters may mean that the future is less certain. Whether we are believers or not, churchgoers or not, if we all work together to look after this quintessential part of our village it could continue to play an active part in village life for generations to come.

A DIFFERENT KIND OF CHRISTMAS TREE FESTIVAL 2022 REPAIR, REUSE RECYCLE, ST ODULPH'S CHURCH PILLATON

The baking hot summer has moved on into history, the rain dances proved successful, drenching the gardeners on their way up to the Village show. Children have gone back to school in real classrooms, Trago is selling tinsel, it must be time for Pillaton to return to normal and start planning Christmas.

Thank you to everyone who played a part in making the Jubilee Flower Festival such a fitting tribute to the Queen on her 70 years on the throne, it was beautiful and will be a hard act to follow, so the next enterprise must be very different.

Pillaton Church now invites you to have a go at making something from nothing. an eco-friendly Christmas Tree Festival- repair, reuse, recycle is the theme for this year.

'Oh, are they wanting us to fill the church with a load of rubbish?' you ask. Well, no, not exactly, but there could be some of that recrafted into treasure. The idea is to either make a Christmas Tree from recycle materials, use a rooted tree, repair an old artificial tree, even prune a branch from growing conifer, anything that has had a previous use will do, just do not cut down a living tree and put it in a pot.

The trees can be three dimensional or flat to hang up, just as long as it is in the recognisable triangular shape of the traditional Christmas Tree Decorations may be made out of anything too, it depends where your talents lie, knitting. Fabric, glass, metal, plant material, clay or just paper. Lights used need to be battery operated on a timer as there are limited power points in the church.

Plastic can be used for decorations as long as it is re-fashioned from its original purpose, thereby reducing the amount of single use plastic going into our waste bins. Plastic cannot be eliminated; it is now an essential part of our lives, but it can be used with more care to limit the damage it can do to our environment. Your trees can illustrate your individual interests, carry a message, or represent your hobby groups, the choice is yours, this is not primarily a competition but there could possibly be prizes?

Trina has offered to host an afternoon in November, at the Weary Friar, for children to make little Christmas trees to be included in the main display in the Church ready for the Toy Service on 11 December.

PILLATON 1922 plus

Robin Dwane's interesting article on "Pillaton 1922" which appeared in the last Village News had a section on the unveiling of the village War Memorial in August 1922. The Rev Somerfield is quoted as being unhappy that our country was failing to meet the expectations of the Fallen. When Lieut. Colonel W. P. Dury was called upon to unveil the memorial, he began by wondering what the Fallen would think of the "criminal bungle we have made of the fruits of their victory." He said that we would search "in vain for the smallest sign of that golden age of universal peace and prosperity, that new world, that land fit for heroes so glibly promised us by politicians." We need to "uproot the poisonous weed of class hatred, which is choking our growth, to put our backs into restoring our country's old prestige and prosperity and work for peace in the world."

These comments repeated the sentiments of other speakers at the ceremony, but Colonel Drury went further. He doubted whether the League of Nations would be able to keep the peace given the failure of conference after conference while Europe was in greater turmoil than in 1914. Using a biblical reference, he reminded the crowd listening that "a strong man armed" came close to overwhelming us. We should be aware that "he is already massing hidden forces which are intended to be employed again one day against us. "Colonel Drury doesn't identify who this mystery "strong man" is, but we can assume that he is referring to Germany and the rise of nationalist and fascist leaders in Europe. Benito Mussolini, leader of the National Fascist Party of Italy, became the leader of the Italian government in

October 2022 and Adolf Hitler became chairman of the Nationalist Socialist German Workers' Party in 1921. By coincidence immediately alongside this report in the Western Morning News was a piece noting that Mr Isaac Foot MP (who had won the by-election for Bodmin in February 1922 and was speaking at a Liberal Party rally in Pensilva), is reported as regretting the deteriorating relations with France under the threat of bankruptcy in Germany which was experiencing hyper inflation. Mr Foot also blamed the failure of the Versailles conference to settle fully the amount of reparations Germany had to pay and this was a key factor in the financial disturbances facing Europe. Mr Foot had clearly noted the piece on the Fallen in Pillaton and three days later the Western Morning News carried a column by Mr Foot contesting some of Colonel

Drury's comments. He agreed with Colonel Drury in that he found "a deadly lethargy among the people as regards political affairs which he attributed to the disillusion and disappointment of the electorate over the country's recovery from the war. He went on to correct "in a friendly manner" the biblical quote made by Colonel Drury referring to a "strong man armed" which affected its meaning. He also argued that spending on defence was still very high with an army of occupation to pay for, but if there was further expansion of military spending it would leave nothing for dealing with the nation's serious social problems. As for the League of Nations, could Colonel Drury think of any better way of achieving peace?

In October 1922 Conservative back-benchers (now known as the 1922 Committee) met at the Carlton Club and decided to ditch Lloyd George as Prime Minister and chose Baldwin instead. A general election was called in November 1922 and many Liberal Party MPs lost their seats, including Winston Churchill who was at that time a Liberal Party member. Isaac Foot managed to hold on to his seat for Bodmin. In the end, Colonel Drury's dire predictions were more accurate than Mr Foot's. The League of Nations was unable to prevent World War II while a series of dithering British governments failed dismally to either prepare effective military defences or deal with a range of deteriorating economic and social conditions. A hundred years later we are still familiar with the rise of belligerent dictatorships and the sacking of Prime Ministers by the 1922 Committee. Unfortunately, we also have global warming and nuclear threats to cope with.

CITIZENS ADVICE CORNWALL


